




CREATIVE WRITING

Me, employed, graduating with a fab degree, but also pretty sad my university days were over




Creative Writing What my degree looked like...

I did a Joint Honours degree. This means I studied half of a degree in two subjects alongside each other. I did English Literature alongside my Creative Writing course. There was a lot of overlap, which was really good as it allowed me to get a deeper understanding of my subject areas. The English Lit side of my course allowed me to do creative assignments and my Creative Writing side allowed the opportunity to complete academic essays.

I had four lectures (these are talks) and four seminars (group work) a week, totally 12 hours of "contact-time" a week.

For creative writing, I usually had a lecture on a topic followed by a seminar where we would discuss our creative work outside of class and hone it to make sure it was as good as it could be.


Creative Writing What my degree looked like...

- Hypertexts (writing for the internet, interactive texts and coding)






Creative Writing Where it took me...
